#### Flooding on West Street

Residents of West Street will know about the problems caused by recent prolonged rainfall. A representative of the Parish Council reported the issue to Anglian Water and our County Councillor Tom Smith.

After a site inspection Anglian Water stated that the problem of sewage coming out of the drains was caused by there being too much water for the village pumping station. He suggested that some properties may have their rainwater drainage connected to the sewers, and the pumping station which sends water to the treatment plant can't cope with the volume produced by extreme rainfall. However, the water company was not to blame.

Cllr Smith arranged for sandbags to be delivered to one of the affected properties and has met with the Head of Highways and the flood officer to discuss the problems we are experiencing. He has been sent pictures of the floodwater near the Butcher's Arms and further down West St near the school. We will give further updates when there is any news.

## **History of Education In North Kesley**

By the will of Sir John Nelthorpe, 1669, "all children of the inhabitants of North Kelsey shall be taught the Latin, Greek and Hebrew languages, to write, also arithmetic and shall have their learning gratis".

To what extent this was achieved is unknown but returns made by the Rev R Bingham showed that there were two small schools in North Kelsey in 1818, of about 30 pupils. During one period there were no fewer than four schools, opened in 1819, 1823, 1824 and 1832. In 1842 there was a parish school with Robert Dixon as schoolmaster, which had 11 boys educated by subscription. By 1856, however, efforts were being made to establish a village school. *The Stamford Mercury* reported that year:

"Mr John Cox, a leading parishioner has become thoroughly convinced that the dark age of the locality ought to pass away and considers it a disgrace of the place that such scanty provision for educational purposes should continue. Deeply impressed by the exhibition of juvenile morality in this parish, this gentleman is determined to aid the vicar in carrying out this great consideration. Mr Cox works strenuously in obtaining subscriptions from without his parish, there not being the hearty co-operation on the part of the parishioners necessary. The reason assigned to the tardiness is that both the vicar and Mr Cox intend the school to be of an exclusive character, closing its doors against all children who do not attend Church Sunday School".

Although no date is known a National School was built, but soon to be replaced.

The *Stamford Mercury* reported 31<sup>st</sup> July 1857 that a new school was opened in North Kelsey on 23<sup>rd</sup> July by the Bishop of the Diocese. The school, built to accommodate 100 children, was designed by the architect Mr William White and praised for its design, lighting, and ventilation. This was a National School. National Schools were founded by the National Society for Promoting Religious Education in 1811. The aim of the society was to set up a school in every parish in the country. This aim was helped by grants made by the state from 1833. A school for about 60 children was also attached to the Mission Church in North Kelsey Moor in 1873.

The Education Act of 1870 caused friction in the village, and it was even whispered in the press that pressure was put on several parishioners by their landlords to vote contrary to their wishes for a Board School. The Act required the parish to form a School Board if there was a shortfall in the provision of education of the village's children (5-13 years inclusive).

Church schools could make this provision - grants were available for 50% of the running costs, but capital funding was phased out. As indicated above, the North Kelsey National School was open only to children who attended the Church Sunday School. There was a demand in the village therefore, strongly supported by the non-conformists, for day school education free from Anglian doctrine in which the curriculum would include no religious education other than simple bible reading. School Boards had the power to raise funds from a rate to build and run non-denominational schools. The 1880 Education Act made education free and compulsory (before then the school was funded partly by subscription and "partly by the weekly pence of scholars" - Post Office Directory 1868).

A School Board was definitely in place by 1882 (the names of elected members were published in the press) and a decision was made to establish a Board School, using the premises of the existing Church School, in 1886. The posts of Master and Assistant Mistress were offered to the present teachers and accepted by them. In 1895, tenders were invited for "the erection of a new school" by the North Kelsey School Board. The school was built, to accommodate 180 pupils, in 1896. The building still stands today and is used as the village hall. The National School continued in use as a parish hall and a Sunday school for many years and was sold in 1978 to the North Kelsey Community Association for the sum of £3,250. Renovations included the building of a new kitchen and toilet block (*Rev Kerswill*, 1982). The building remains today, but as a private property.

The newest School is Kelsey Primary on Chapel Street and was officially opened in 1988.
