Hi Everyone!

History of Communications

Roads: Responsibility for roads which passed through a village had rested with the parish since 1555. Parishes had to appoint surveyors to determine what annual maintenance had to be carried and parishioners then had to provide perhaps four days of unpaid labour each year, *"statute of labour"*, to do the work. The *Stamford Mercury* reported that, at a meeting held in June 1829 at the Plough Inn in South Kelsey, convened to consider the dangerous state of the roads in North Kelsey, it was resolved that *"they should be indicted and the necessary steps involved taken"*. The Highway Act 1835 abolished the *"statute of labour"*, allowing the salary of a surveyor and costs of labour to be paid from rates levied on occupiers of land. Although parishes could join to form a board, comprising of representatives from the parishes (Way Wardens) and justices of the county, to determine rates and salaries, each parish remained separately responsible for the costs of repairs.

The Parliamentary Enclosure, finally completed in 1840, may have improved the situation in that four new roads were constructed – Caistor Road (Station Road today), East Hall Road, Rasen Road (Ellmore Lane today) and South Kelsey Road (Grange Road today). The latter two followed existing tracks, which explains their twisting routes. The original contract for *"forming and gravelling"* these roads was awarded to Messrs Eve and Dobson @ £3 a chain (22 yards).

North Kelsey has always been some distance from the nearest major highway and even in the 18th century would not have benefited greatly from the turnpikes opened in 1765 between Caistor and Brigg or Barton on Humber to Lincoln and beyond (A15 today). It wasn't until the Highway Act 1959 that the responsibility for the maintenance of minor roads passed from parishes to local authorities. It would be interesting to know when the roads in and around the village were first surfaced with tarmac (first used in 1902) or asphalt.



Waterways: There's no evidence to suggest that a wharf was ever built in the parish alongside the Ancholme, but it seems that some goods were loaded and unloaded from the Caistor Canal at South Kelsey. The distance from the village to the canal terminal at Moortown, 2½ miles, was not excessive for horse drawn vehicles.

Rail: The coming of the Manchester, Sheffield & Lincs Railway (later to become the Great Central Railway) in 1848, and the building of North Kelsey Station on North Kelsey Moor, would have had a major impact on the economy and lives of people in the village. The station closed in 1965.

Telegraph: A single wire telegraph connection was extended from North Kelsey Station to Caistor Post Office in 1870. It wasn't until 1898 that the service was extended to the Post office in North Kelsey, but one example of its use was recorded in the *Stamford Mercury* which reported in October 1903 that the Caistor Fire Brigade had been summoned by wire to a stackyard fire in North Kelsey. It took a horse drawn appliance just 35 minutes from the call to arrive.
