

## Hi everyone!

Now that the days are shortening, we can reflect upon some tremendous village achievements. The wonderful summer fete, the Butchers Arms Beer Festival, the continued success of the Community Shop and the annual Party in the Paddock.

Now onto the serious stuff!!

**Speeding in North Kelsey Moor:** The Parish Council has bought a Vehicle Activated Speed Indicator like the one on East Hall Lane and will be installed at North Kelsey Moor. It will be sited between the Railway Crossing and Grasby Road and can be rotated manually to signal traffic in either direction. Speed data will be recorded so that if vehicles regularly exceed the limit this information can be forwarded to the Police and North Lincolnshire County Council Highways Department.

## **Solar Farm:**

In August, several residents attended the parish council meeting to present their views about the proposed Solar Farm on the old Caistor Airfield site. Planning permission has not yet been applied for but we have investigated some of the concerns raised.

**Wildlife**: Hedges on Station Road and Grasby Road will be repaired and the land beneath the panels left fallow or grazed by sheep. This is judged to produce a net benefit to local wildlife.

**Agriculture:** The proposed site is not classed as 'Best and Most Versatile' (BMV) farmland. After about 35 years the solar farm lease will finish, and the land will return to use by its owner. The panels are mainly glass and aluminium and will be recycled.

**Visual impact**: The hedges on Station Road and Grasby Road will be repaired to screen the site from the road. Panels will be up to 3.5 metres high.

**Batteries**: There is no proposal to install batteries on the site and there are no batteries on the company's other UK sites. The electricity produced will feed directly into the National Grid via existing infrastructure.

**Construction traffic:** Deliveries to the site will take place over a period of nine to twelve months, using the B1434 and Station Road. It seems that this cannot be avoided.

**Community Investment:** Under current proposals, once the Solar Farm is operational, there would be a Community Benefit Fund of almost £100,000 available. Grants could be given for community development, education, environmental protection, recreation, heritage and culture, and relief of those in need. ## **Playing Field Survey**

Thank you to everyone who completed the recent playing field survey. We received 13 responses via the QR code displayed at the site. 77% of people were 'Happy' or 'Very Happy' with the playing field and park but there were a few concerns raised such as the surface of the children's play area, mole damage, the condition

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of some of the play equipment and dogs not responding to their owner's recall. There were also requests for more wildflowers and seating in the woodland area. In response, we have added more bark to the play area and will look at further improvement as funds allow.

However, we are keen for as many residents as possible to feel that the park is available for them. If you didn't respond earlier, are there any changes you would like to see that would make you more likely to visit the park?

# The River Ancholme and Kelsey Carr's

The discovery of an oak flat-bottomed boat, dated to 800 BC, in the bed of the river indicates that the Ancholme has played an important role in the history of this part of Lincolnshire for 3,000 years or more (the boat is on display in the Brigg Heritage Museum). Between 1289 and 1418 the river was mentioned 13 times in the Patent Rolls (the register of records issued by the Crown), with the need to keep the channel scoured for both navigation and flood prevention mentioned most often. In 1635 Sir John Monson was granted powers to construct a new river to improve drainage. Meanders were removed and a new channel was dug to bypass Brigg, although the old channel was retained. This helped navigation but the main purpose of this work drain Ancholme flood was the Levels (its plain) for agricultural use.





The flood plain lies for the most part below the high-water level of the spring tides. The original vegetation was grass and salt marsh, suitable only for some summer grazing and wild fowling in winter. It does not seem that this land, the Carr's, was ever common land – the only common land the peasantry of North Kelsey had access to was Caistor Moor. Instead, the major landowners always had an ambition to turn the Carr's into productive agricultural land, most of which were already enclosed i.e. divided into fields, in advance of the Parliamentary Enclosures which followed in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Neglect of Monson's work over the following 100 years or more, however, meant that tillage was not possible as crops were frequently lost to floods. It was not until after an Act of Parliament in 1824 and a major construction scheme, including a new lock and sluice at South Ferriby, was completed in 1842 that it became a reasonably safe option to put the Carr's under the plough.





Despite problems with drainage the Ancholme remained important throughout this period as an inland waterway. Between 1793 and 1798 a canal was constructed from the Ancholme, via South Kelsey, to a terminal at Moortown (Caistor Canal) which was used to carry a wide range of bulky goods, including: cereal crops, potatoes, beans wool etc.; bricks, tiles, stone flags, slates etc.; cast metal goods, timber and

manufactured goods. Its main business, however, was coal. It operated for only 50-60 years but, the citizens of North Kelsey must have gained some benefit from its brief existence.

**Neighbourhood Watch:** Is about people getting together with their neighbours to take action to reduce crime. They're community initiatives owned and run by their members which are supported by the police but not owned by them, although we sometimes run them.
